

It is up to our dinghy dock leaseholders to assure that their dinghies fit within the lines, and do not overhang the edge of the dock. This is both a safety issue and a fairness issue. I appreciate everyone's efforts in making this a fun, safe season!

Sailing Activities Report

Six one-design classes are coming to Wickford Regatta 2023. The format will be similar to past years but the 505 class has designated the Wickford Regatta as their New England Championship and will be sailing on Friday as well. A number of boats will be coming from the mid-Atlantic states as well as from Quebec and Ontario. 15 boats are registered with more expected.

The F-18s will be making a strong showing as well with 12 boats registered including a number of new teams that will be based here on Narragansett Bay. The Finn Class is drawing from the biggest geographical area with competitors from Illinois, Missouri, Nova Scotia, and Ontario. The 12 boat fleet is the biggest ever for a Wickford Regatta and may grow a bit more.

The ILCA 7 and ILCA 6 classes, formerly known as Laser and Laser Radial, will have similar numbers with a combined total near 30. Finally, the I-420 class will be around 6 boats which is well below their normal participation due to a conflict with the High School National Championship.

There will be an informal get together on Friday, 6/2 at the club after racing for the 505s and the normal regatta dinner will be on Saturday evening, 6/3.

## Mary Grace's Diary – There's a lot of serious regatta history made by WYC!

You know about Wednesday Night Racing and you may know about the Club's participation in Junior Race Week. Both are a part of our mission – to teach sailing to those who live near the water and spread the love of the sport. But, did you know that long before Sail Newport existed, in fact even before there was a Newport Bridge, our Wickford Yacht Club hosted the major international dinghy championship for two Olympic classes? Here's how things began.

The first Wickford Regatta was in May 1972 when our club was only 9 years old. It was Lasers only, and in fact, the May date made it one of the first Laser Regattas ever held. Anywhere. Lasers were a new class back then, and the only distributor in Massachusetts and RI was CanAm Sailcraft, owned by Skip Whyte and Dave Perry. Although CanAm was a Massachusetts company, Skip's support network for regatta management - meaning the bodies necessary to do the work - was here, so Wickford was where the regatta was held. At that first Wickford Regatta, all of the Laser sail numbers were between 100 (the first Laser ever off the assembly line) and 800. The entire team from Performance Sailcraft (home of the Laser) were competitors, since they were trying to establish the Laser as a legitimate class. Imagine that...they weren't sure that the Laser would catch on!

The team included Bruce Kirby the designer of the Laser, Ian Bruce the President and Chief Engineer, and Peter Bjorn the production manager. There were five other US competitors including Ron Loring, Skip Whyte, and Henry Bossett. The rest of the competitors were hot shots from Canada. where the most Laser purchases had been made. The 16 competitors sailed two races on Saturday and one on Sunday. There was a Regatta Dinner at the Club that included cook your own steak from Ryan's Market and beer from Wickford Packey. Henry Bossett, URI Class of '72, won that first regatta. No one from Performance Sailcraft placed, but the Laser was about to become history. By September more than 50 Laser regattas has been held across the US and Canada.

The next year the Wickford Regatta added a second class, the brand new Olympic Class, the 470 (hummm...wonder why that class was included) and all of the 470 competitors were Olympic campaigners. The Regatta ran off the town beach with over 30 Lasers and 25 470s. For many aspiring racers, the Wickford Regatta was their first opportunity to spent time in a quality dinghy park, and for some, that taste is all it took to hook them on serious dinghy racing.

By 1976, the Wickford Regatta was a serious international sailing event and that quad it was the last event held before the Olympic Trials. Every US in sailor in 5 classes who hoped to go to The Games was in Wickford and it was glorious! As was the, by now, legendary Regatta Dinner.

In 1977 the 505 class was added to NOR and hats, actually visors, were introduced. FDs were added in 1978, and the International 420s came in 1979. By 1981, the volunteers at WYC needed a break from the stress of the ever expanding event and called a halt to the Regatta. It was picked up by Barrington Yacht Club as the RIISA Regatta, where it was held until 2008 when it was disbanded.

But wait! In 2008, Commodore Richard Breault conspired with Member at Large Barbara Jackson to create a Sailing Activities Committee at WYC. They had Skip Whyte, recently returned to Pleasant Street, in mind for the Chairperson...with the idea of reviving the Wickford Regatta. The first Wickford Regatta of the Modern Era was held in 2009 with seven classes competing. The Sailing Activities Committee created a logo and made this quaint custom.) the decision to provide a great hat to every competitor. These hats can be seen in dinghy parks around the world. No Kidding! The complexity of the regatta's race management made it a testing ground for the online registration and scoring system now known as Regatta Network.

Since 2008, we've had 15 years of racing. Competitors have come from Canada, Europe, South Africa, as well as from Florida to Maine, the Great Lakes, Texas, and California. More than 18 classes have been invited over the years, and for several classes it was the only regatta ever held before the class was disbanded. We've registered more than 1,200 teams for the Wickford Regatta which means we've hosted more than 1,750 sailors on the race courses. That's a lot of hats!!!

This year's Wickford Regatta runs June 9 – 11 and will host five classes of racers. We expect 70 dinghy class boats sailed by 94 skippers and crew. The Regatta is designated as the New England Championships for the 505 class. For the competing classes, the Wickford Regatta is the highlight of the Spring racing season.

Don't believe me? Check out the racing clips after the competition!

To execute this level of racing on two courses takes a lot of volunteers. There's year-round planning, marketing, and permit gathering before we get to the event. Each day of the event it takes at least 28 volunteers to execute race management on the two race courses, a team of two official scorers located in the clubhouse, eight volunteers to staff the race office at the beach, five volunteers to manage the venue on the beach plus five or more dolly Dollies, and ten shoreside volunteers to manage hospitality at the Club. (When we first revived the Wickford Regatta in 2008, we used to deliver lunches to competitors on the race course. A gang of 12 ran this operation until 2019 when we came to our senses and retired

Regatta supplies - the signal timers, signal flags, marks, and equipment that our ranked regattas require - are expensive and have long lead times to arrive. After the Regatta, these supplies go into Club rotation for use by our Wednesday Night race fleet, keeping the Wednesday race fees low and the equipment diverse and deluxe. And of course, Regatta revenue goes into the Club's general fund.

In retrospect, the guys from Performance Sailcraft needn't have worried. Lasers did catch on. (Ya think?) Laser sail numbers now have more than 10 digits. They have been around so long that there is an International Federation of Laser Masters.

This group has devised a way to provide handicaps so that Laser sailors can compete across age groups. From its inception until 2015, the two day New England Laser Masters had been held off the beach in Newport in the fall. Most of the competitors also attend the Wickford Regatta, and enjoyed our hospitality, hot showers, and dolly Dollies more than they liked 3rd Beach.

The Great Grand Master himself, Peter Seidenberg, asked Wickford to host the regatta and the class has held their New England Regionals off the town beach ever since. With only one race area, this is a much easier regatta to manage. The Masters Regatta only requires ten race management volunteers on the course, a team of two official scorers, one person to manage the race office, six or more dolly Dollies, and six shoreside volunteers to manage hospitality at the club. No hats at this regatta, but there is pizza on the beach before the awards ceremony.

Wickford Yacht Club has run a few specialty regattas, too. For example, in 2011, without much warning, the Hyannis Regatta removed the 505 Class from competition. 505's are an important and somewhat legendary class for the Wickford Yacht Club, so our Sailing Committee agreed to see what we could do. As it turns out, a few J-105s wanted a very special, very exclusive private regatta. In August. Specifically in Wickford. At any cost. The date that worked for the J-105s coincided with the Hyannis Regatta and the WYC cruise.

So, we put the 505s and J-105s into one regatta. Problem solved for the sailors. But the timing meant that many WYC members would be gone, making staffing tricky. Fortunately, Doug Nannig was going to be in town and acted as our PRO, creating two race courses with one start and finish line. Most of the WYC social committee was around to provide the requested dinner. Rotating volunteers on the water got us through.

J-105s are keel boats, but the 505s needed a launch site. The Town wouldn't allow the beach to be used in August, so we secured a permit from Quonset to use Compass Rose Beach. Charlie Donadio from RI Fast Ferry allowed us to run a VERY long hose from his dock to the beach for washdown. With these pieces in place, the West Passage Regatta was born.

Although the J-105 sailors found very nice accommodations, the 505 competitors decided that their banishment from Hyannis required them to act as renegades. They not only launched from Compass Rose Beach, they pitched tents and slept there. When the Social Committee brought them breakfast on Sunday morning, they were found fishing off the beach with some locals. The small but mighty team from WYC provided great racing and the one and done West Passage Regatta provided the Club with sufficient revenue to upgrade the kitchen. We even purchased a new ice machine which is still in use.

In 2017 Wickford hosted the Archepelligo Regatta, a family event with a gift of deed that rotates around Narragansett Bay. In 2012 Wickford co-hosted the Atlantic Coast Championships for the Lightning class.

As you can see, we love racing at the Wickford Yacht Club and sailors love to race here. Let the Sailing Committee know if you have any time on a regatta morning or at the end of the day to do dolly duty. It's fun to be a dolly Dollie and you get to meet everyone!
