

Why did you decide on yacht design as a career? I started drawing boats when I was about 5 or 6. I have been boat-crazy my entire life, but it was after getting my design degree at Rhode Island School of Design and landing a job with Fontaine Design Group in Portsmouth that I realized that I might actually be able to pursue my passion as a career.

Raised in Tiverton and now living in Wickford, Ezra Smith is chief designer at Newport Yacht Builders, based at Safe Harbor *Newport Shipyard with an offsite build facility in the North End.* After working for Ted Hood and Ted Fontaine and running his own architectural and marine design business in Newport, Smith partnered with Jim Thompson and Ashley Reville to do major refits and new custom builds, using a proprietary design and build process. Interiors or bare hulls are laser scanned, components designed in 3D, CNC (computer) cut, and custom fabricated to a high degree of precision before onboard installation. Newport Yacht Builders' latest project is a custom Mussel Ridge 46 tuna fishing boat.

WYC FIRST CRUISE OUT OF THE BAY

The Wickford Yacht Club's first "out of the Bay" cruise left Wickford early on a Friday morning in mid-June 1973. The three boat flotilla was made up of Al Henry's Pearson 30 "Wanderjar" with Al and Bob Ferry aboard; John and Mary DiMartino on their Cheoy Lee 26 "Alle Del Mare"; and Barbara and Bruce Dawson sailing on their Morgan 22, "PUFF"(with a 6hp outboard assist). Destination: Cuttyhunk Island, 28 miles away.

After an uneventful "crossing", the boats arrived at Cuttyhunk Harbor in mid-afternoon and set anchor in a three-boat raft. At that time, the only moorings in the harbor were resident moorings in the northern section of the pond as well as pilings adjacent to the docks. Following a pleasant night's sleep and a less than hardy breakfast, the crews set off to explore our newly discovered "Treasure" island.

Cuttyhunk's location between Vineyard Sound and Buzzards Bay was an ideal location for an early warning site for German ships and submarines. Remnants of the embattlements still stand today. The island today is a convenient stopover for boats heading from the mainland to Martha's Vineyard. Moorings inside and outside the harbor were an important improvement to the stopover. In the early years, the afternoon entertainment was watching people try to set an anchor and then having to fend off boats that dragged in the middle of the night. The island is serviced by a ferry that runs several times a day from New Bedford. Departures were celebrated with youngsters diving off the ferry dock pilings, a tradition that continues today. Years ago, "Stormin Norman" Gringrass flew a seaplane to Cuttyhunk from the mainland and landed in the anchorage area. Departures and arrivals were enjoyed by the youngsters who would chase Norman in their dinghies as he was landing or taking off.

Cuttyhunk became the first stop for WYC cruises, with a party on the channel beach. A fire pit was created by scavenging driftwood from the shore. Everyone brought their own food from a simple hot dog dinner and roasted marshmallows to a lobster feast! Meals and drinks in those days were always "do it yourself." Entertainment was provided by Jim Latimer and John Wilson playing guitar. They always sang "American Pie", or as John's father called the song, "Chevy on the Levy and Dead Skunk in the Middle of the Road."

We never could have expected that three boats (the largest just 30 feet) venturing out of the bay without benefit of modern electronic devices would become the start of such a wonderful WYC cruise tradition. Come back with your guitar, John Wilson, and lead us in "Dead Skunk" again.
