Vice Commodore's Update



March 25, 2024. Somewhere in the Caribbean.

"Hey guys? There's a lot of water down here." There we were, making 8.5 knots in a 20 knot breeze, a few hours into a beautiful reach from St. Lucia to St. Vincent on a 51' Bavaria monohull. And then one of the crew, the son-in-law of our captain, noticed that the floorboards were awash down below. We had done our own safety briefing, and were aware that the electric bilge pump did not have a float switch. We hadn't actually located the manual bilge pump, but at the start of a Caribbean bare-boat charter, we were enthusiastic about getting underway, and failed to pursue that detail. We also did not realize that the electric bilge pump was no longer working.

We did know that the life jackets were stored below in the forward cabin (about as far away from the cockpit as you can get). We weren't sinking, yet, but 6 inches in a 51' boat is a lot of volume. The water was high enough in the engine compartment that we did not want to start the engine. We furled the jib and started bailing. The captain, his wife, their teenage foreign exchange student, the captain's daughter and her husband, and the captain's father-in-law, all formed a bucket brigade. I was charged with the helm and the deck. Nothing like singlehanding a 50-footer...

We eventually noticed that the water seemed to rise faster on port tack than on starboard tack. The problem was that when headed south with a nice easterly, it's all port tack. And sailing closer to land seemed like a better option than heading out into the Atlantic. Fortunately, the son-in-law was a contractor. He managed to jury rig the fried electric bilge pump, and also rig a siphon pump using one of the shower drains and spare tubing. We made it to an anchorage on St. Vincent without incident. We did not find the leak that night, but on an even keel, we did not seem to take on water.

Same issue the next day, until the son-in-law, crawling deep in a storage locker in the aft starboard cabin, noticed daylight. The interior cap for a 1.5" diameter tube (that housed an emergency swim ladder accessible from the water line) was sloshing around in the compartment. On port tack, that tube was well below the waterline, piping seawater directly on board. Once the cap was replaced and secured, the water ingress ceased. We pumped her dry, and dry she stayed. The remainder of our cruise had other minor challenges, but by then we were a tight, trusting group who had come through shared adversity.

Plenty of lessons learned: Check your electric bilge pump. Identify your manual bilge pump. Don't leave the dock until those issues are addressed. When at sea, stay focused on the problem, but delegate so that the boat's safety is not jeopardized by hyperfocus. In retrospect, we should have put the life jackets on. If you're bailing, that's a sign that all is not well. Oh, and keep a contractor on board. They can come in really handy.

Dockside, allow me to express my thanks to all of the robust volunteers who got the docks striped and numbered in time for this season. Many folks came together on short notice to get this task done. And it looks great!

It's almost time to splash the boats!

Fleet Captain's Report

May is a month filled with much merriment in Wickford Cove.Dinghies bloom on our docks, in-water and rack spaces as mariners set out to their vessels and commence the boating season. We'll be kicking of the Wednesday Night Solstice Series, enjoying upper deck Wine Downs, and prepping for the summer cruise. I'm eager to don my new blue blazer and celebrate Commissioning Day. George and I will also be shifting from sails to power as we commission our new cruiser, Cabernet and sell our 26' Pearson.

Members who hold dinghy storage spaces received an announcement with current assignments and the 2024 revised Dinghy Storage Policy. We ask everyone to please return the initial Acknowledgement document and affixing an ID sticker on your dinghies before placing them in the assigned spaces. Thank you all for supporting the revised policy and ensuring the safety and enjoyment of those who access the WYC waterfront.

The east docks that were resurfaced last November will be striped and numbered shortly. While members assigned to those spaces may be eager to set out their dinghies, we ask that they please wait until the spaces are lined and numbered. Contact me (Fleetcaptian@wickfordyc.com) if a brief delay creates a hardship. The next section of the east dock is slated for resurfacing late October or the first weekend of November. I'm working with the House and Building Committees to plan small work teams and recruit highly skilled volunteers for this project.

Planning for the spring cruise is proceeding with a tentative venue at Ida Lewis Yacht Club over the weekend of June 21st. Summer cruise prep is well underway with a catered dock party (via the Oyster Barge) at Cuttyhunk to kick off the cruise on July 27th, a cocktail reception at Parker's Boat Yard (Red Brook) on July 30th, and a cruise dinner in Padanaram (New Bedford Yacht Club) on August 1st.Registration and fees will be announced via Constant Contact within the next six weeks. Many thanks to the Port Captains who have been taking care of details for mooring and activities for each of the ports of call.

Lastly, May 22 is not just for the orientation of Suzanne Thom's race committee, its National Maritime Day. Being a yacht club, we should all take a moment to thank those who have protected our shores. Sailing Activities Report



Wickford Regatta.

Only 45 days (give or take) until the Wickford Regatta!

In case you've forgotten, here's some background about this event. The Wickford Regatta is one of Narragansett bay's most important regattas with a storied history. It began in May 1972 when our club was only 9 years old as a Lasers only event. In fact, the May date made it one of the first Laser Regattas held. Anywhere. Lasers were a new class back then, and all of the Laser sail numbers were between 100 (the first Laser ever off the assembly line) and 800. 16 competitors sailed two races on Saturday and one on Sunday. There was a Regatta Dinner at the Club that included cook your own steak from Ryan's Market and beer from Wickford Packey.

In 1973 we added a second class, the brand new 470 Olympic Class and all of the 470 competitors were Olympic campaigners. The Regatta ran off the Town beach with over 30 Lasers and 25 470s. By the third year there were limits on the number of competitors in each class. Demand to compete in the Wickford Regatta had outgrown the Club's ability to support all of the interested sailors. By 1976, the Wickford was a serious international sailing event and was the last event before the US Olympic Trials. Every US in sailor in the 470 who hoped to go to The Show was in Wickford. The regatta was glorious! As was, by now, the legendary Regatta Dinner. In 1977 the 505 class was added, FDs were added in 1978, and the International 420s came in 1979. By 1981 the volunteers at WYC needed a break from the stress of the event and called a halt to the Regatta. It was picked up by Barrington Yacht Club as the RIISA Regatta, and was held until 2008 when they got tired too.

But wait! In 2009 WYC revived the Wickford Regatta with seven classes competing on two courses. The Sailing Activities Committee created a logo and made the decision to provide a great hat to every competitor, which can be seen in dinghy parks around the world. No kidding! Wickford Regatta was one of the pilots for the online registration and scoring system now known as Regatta Network. More than 18 classes have been invited over the years, with competitors from Canada, Europe, South Africa, as well as from Florida to Maine, the Great Lakes, Texas, and California. We've registered more than 1,200 teams for the Wickford Regatta which means we've hosted more than 1,750 sailors on the race courses.

This year's Wickford Regatta runs June 8 – 9 and will host five classes of racers. We expect 70 dinghy class boats sailed by 94 skippers and crew. To execute this level of racing on two courses takes a lot of volunteers. There's year-round planning, marketing, and permit gathering before we get to the event. Each day of the event it takes at least 28 volunteers to execute race management on the two race courses, a team of two official scorers located in the clubhouse, eight volunteers to staff the race office at the beach, five volunteers to manage the venue on the beach plus five or more dolly Dollies, and ten shoreside volunteers to manage hospitality at the Club.

The expensive signal timers, signal flags, marks, and equipment that are required for a ranked regatta like this one are used all summer by our Wednesday Night race fleet. And of course, the revenue generated by the Regatta helps to support our Club's finances. So, if you haven't volunteered yet, send me your name and contact info. It's fun to be part of our history!



Our Spring cleanup day at the Club will be Saturday, May 4th at 9:00 AM.


Hello Fellow Members:
